



A Note From Fr. Jeff

Too Busy Not To Pray



As we entered Lent this year, I began a new message (homily) series entitled Too Busy Not To Pray. Prayer is one of those things we talk about a lot at church, yet many struggle with prayer. Some wonder am I doing it right? But there is no wrong way to pray — except not praying! These are just some ways, some suggestions to try to deepen your relationship with God through prayer.

In our first week, we examined how busy we are; sometimes too busy to pray. But I suggested that maybe we are too busy NOT to pray. What is more important than time with our God? We need to slow down! God wants to spend time with you. So, I suggested using a journal to slow your RPMs down and to enter into prayer by reflecting on your day and then writing down your prayers, and finally praying them aloud.

In the second week, we examined how important it is to listen to God. We need to find some quiet space and time to simply listen to what our God wants to say. It is easier for us to fill all our prayer time, not allowing God to get a word in. But that is not much of a conversation. God wants to be in conversation with you. We need to make space and listen to that quiet still voice of our God.

In the third week, I offered a pattern to prayer. It is just one, among many. It tries to be balanced. The pattern uses the word ACTS as the pattern. Adoration: Take a moment and enter God's presence and stand on holy ground. Confession: Take a moment and name your mistakes, find healing and peace. Thanksgiving: Take a moment and express your gratitude for all that God has shared with you. Supplication: Take a moment and ask for help, speak your needs and desires.

In the fourth week, this weekend, we will look at praying like Jesus prayed. After all, he is the expert and wants to teach us.

In the final week, we will consider the hard topic of seemingly unanswered prayers.

Fr. Cody's Corner



What is a relic?

Many of you may have seen the announcement that the heart of St. John Vianney is traveling across Montana. With this event in mind, I thought that I would take the next couples of columns to talk about some of the weirder aspects of Catholicism, namely relics. What is a relic? A relic is an object that pertains to a saint. For instance a piece of the person, something they used, or something that touched them. Relics remind us that the person, saint, actually existed; he/she is a real person who lived like us and died like we will eventually. These objects are considered objects of devotion: a way of making a personal connection with a person who lived a holy life.


Relics fall into three general categories called classes. A 1st class is relic is a piece of the person, for instance a bone fragment, a piece of hair, or a part of their body like a heart. A 2nd class relic is something the person used during their lifetime like a piece of clothing or an object. A 3rd class relic, and the most common form, is something that touched a 1st class relic. This class of relic can be anything from a piece of cloth, to oil, to a medal or crucifix, or even a holy card.

The purpose of relics is to connect us with the person and feel a personal and spiritual connection with the life that person lived and/or the virtues they lived. Some of the common places you fill find relics are in altars, such as the one at Christ the King, and in glass cases call reliquaries. The Cathedral in Helena has many 1st class relics that are regularly cycled through in the reliquary to the left of the altar in St. Mary's chapel.

PROGRESS!



Engaged = These members have a strong psychological and emotional connection to their parish. They are more spiritually committed, more likely to invite friends, family members, and co-workers to events, and give more of their time and resources.

Not Yet Engaged = Members who are not engaged are just as likely as the engaged to be completely "satisfied" with their parish, but their "spiritual commitment" is not as strong and they invite, serve and give less.

Actively Disengaged = These folks either don't show up often or are physically present but are unhappy with their parish and insist on sharing it with others.

WHY Engagement?

Engagement is the measure of health for any organization. If people feel like they belong, are connected and committed to a community, they open and apply themselves to the values and vision of that community.

Over the last six years, we have focused time and resources on building engagement in our parish because parishes exist to spiritually transform individual lives. As a result of this transformation, individuals can positively influence their world.

Engagement is at the heart of evangelization and discipleship.

We know that over the last several decades our country has seen a significant shift away from "cultural Catholicism." Fewer and fewer people are attending churches. Those of us who are deeply rooted in our parish community would say the parish is a home - God's home - where we feel we are a part of God's family. Working toward greater engagement then becomes the way we foster an environment where everyone, as Pope Francis says, can be "touched by the comfort and attraction of God's saving love." That means each of our own actions, and the way we connect with the whole community must make the parish



feel like God's home for others as well, a place where people can encounter Christ's love, feel they belong, and know their gifts are welcomed.

Belonging leads to believing.

People who feel that they belong to a faith community more frequently report these signs of discipleship: praying daily, being satisfied with the circumstances of their lives, forgiving others when they have been hurt, speaking words of kindness when needed, taking a stand on account of their faith, inviting others to their parish, and giving of their time and financial resources. These findings echo the experience of the early disciples described in the Acts of the Apostles. After the disciples encounter Christ, they form a community with other believers that leads to and further strengthens their belief.

Where do we go from here?

Our Pastoral Council will take the data we received and determine how best to focus our future time and resources. We will keep you posted!
