

Fr. Cody's Corner

With Lent a little more than a few weeks away, I sense that many of you are beginning to think about your Lenten Penance. Or perhaps, you have not yet thought about what you plan to give up for Lent. Instead of providing ideas or



guiding your decision making, I want to focus on why we give up something for Lent. The season of Lent was originally developed for the sake of those who are planning to enter the Church at Easter. After the legalization of Christianity in 313, the number of people who wanted to become Christian overwhelmed the Church, which reduced the required two years of preparation to the season of Lent, 40 days. Those 40 days were not just for those entering the Church but for all the Christian people. Those who are already members of the Church would perform some type of fasting or penance to help those journeying to become Christians along their way. The penance was never meant to be about the person who preformed the penance.

Fast forward about 1700 years and we reach our modern church who continues the practice of a Lenten penance. As you begin to think about Lent and ways to celebrate the season well, I invite you to consider a few things about the Lenten Penance. First, the penance is not just about you or for you; it is for the Church. The original idea of the penance was to support those who will enter the Church at Easter. Second, the penance is not about trying to overcome an addiction or perfect yourself. The idea of the penance is that we simplify our lives so that Easter may be more joyful. Thirdly, the penance is about our relationship with God. Taking something out created room in our lives to focus on our relationship with God. The ultimate goal of our penances should be to bring us closer to God; to do something to build and strengthen our relationship with God. So, what will you do to celebrate Lent well?


What is a "catechumen" and what is the "catechumenate?"

Catechumen is the term we use for someone who is in the RCIA **catechumenate**, which is "an extended period during which the candidates are given suitable pastoral formation and guidance, aimed at training them in the Christian life." RCIA #75 This begins with the Rite of Acceptance into the Order of Catechumens and is not just classes meeting in a room for a few months of the year. This is more about journeying together and companioning those who are newly converted to Christ as they "taste the joy that God gives without measure." (RCIA #75.2)
